Background

Climate change and climate-induced disasters are increasingly and continuously threatening development in the Asia-Pacific region. Hard-won development gains are undermined, and underlying drivers of poverty and societal inequalities are exacerbated. Persons in vulnerable situations, in particular women and girls are affected. Moreover, in the region, a majority of the population depends on agriculture and natural resources for their livelihoods, making them particularly susceptible to the adverse effects of climate change. Gender inequality in access to resources, decision-making power, and opportunities exacerbates these challenges. To address the intersection of gender and climate change, it is crucial to foster an inclusive and gender-responsive approach in climate policies and actions.

Key Questions and Outcomes

This side event will examine the following key guiding questions:

- 1. How do climate change impacts differ for women and men in the Asia-Pacific region, and how can policies be designed to address these disparities?
- 2. What are some good practices and successful case studies in promoting gender-responsive climate action in the region?
- 3. What are recommendations and strategies for enhancing gender equality in climate policies and actions?
- 4. In the context of the forthcoming Seventh Asian and Pacific Population Conference, how can the topic be elevated on the agenda?

Bringing together a diverse panel, this side event will facilitate the exchange of lived experiences from different stakeholders and from different parts of the region. The objective is to propose recommendations for action to ensure that gender perspectives are inclusive and responsive to the needs of vulnerable populations including women and girls.
