Kiribati Power of Data | Empowering Kiribati disability inclusion: Report shows progress and gaps

I-Kiribati living with a disability are among the most vulnerable in the com-



munity as they are less likely to be employed, able to read and write, or have access to clean water and proper sanitation, according to a Kiribati National Statistics Office— SPC report. A new national disability monograph shows
